Conservation Hero

Ricardo Moreno, President and Principal Researcher Fundación Yaguará Panamá

Ricardo Moreno is the co-founder, President, and Principal Researcher of Fundación Yaguará Panamá, a nonprofit organization that promotes the conservation and recovery of big cats in Panama. Throughout Panama, Ricardo and his colleagues at Yaguará are using scientific research, education, and public awareness programs to engage local communities and help them protect jaguars and their habitat. Specifically, the team is working with private landowners and ranchers to implement predation prevention measures to decrease human – jaguar conflict, and conducting Panama's first national jaguar census using camera trap methodology. Ricardo's tireless advocacy for jaguar conservation in Panama has earned him a Ford Prize and National Geographic Society Emerging Explorer honors, and marked him as a true conservation hero!



Saving Jaguars in Panama

Over 40% of jaquar habitat in Panama has been lost due to urbanization. infrastructure development, large-scale agriculture, and cattle ranching, and the resulting human-jaguar conflicts threaten the species' long-term conservation. To address these issues. the Panamanian agvernment listed the jaguar as endangered and developed a national action plan to support its Fundación Yaquará conservation. Panamá is workina with Panamanian government, universities, and private landowners to support the national action plan through research, public awareness, and community engagement. Funds awarded from ZCOG's 2022 RMCHA helped purchase camera traps for use by the group in Panama's first national jaquar census, a key component of Panama's National Action Plan for Jaguar Conservation.
